To all those who enjoyed themselves at last year's PRISMA "Sail to the Symphony" event and to our new members: what better way is there to celebrate the summer? Join us for a summer sail, a fabulous lunch, and a great concert with PRISMA 2024.

- Last time we were able to reserve the best seats in the house. This year we have been
 granted the same privilege. This means: no stairs, no bleachers, far enough up audience to
 have an excellent view of everything onstage, yet close enough to have a truly intimate
 musical experience.
- We are informed that both the **dining arrangements** and excellent food preparation will also be repeated. The last menu included salmon, chicken, and vegetarian options, etc.
- The same **transportation** situation discounted ferry rates and a free shuttle to the Evergreen Theatre are as before.
- The package cost is \$110 per person. However, **PRISMA** is offering a 10% discount on the packages for groups like ours, which means the **cost will be \$99.00**.
- We have asked PRISMA to hold 70 packages at the discounted rate, however, these will only be held for us until **April 30**, **2024**, at which time unsold tickets must be returned and final payment made.
- This year's matinee performance includes Mahler's Symphony Concert 2, **The Resurrection Symphony**, and the Finalists of PRISMA's Concerto Competition 2024.

Lawrence and Marie will have a table set up at the March 12, 2024 in person meeting where you can reserve your tickets for the event. NOTE: At the April 9, 2024 general meeting final payment for all tickets will be required. There will be no refunds after payment.



Our speaker for the March meeting will be Bruce Ellis, our club president.


